A TIME TO PLANT, A TIME TO REAP

*For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under the heaven:
a time to be born, and a time to die; a time to plant, and a time to reap.
Ecclesiastes 3:1-2*

The United States has been in a war status since September 11, 2001, both directly and indirectly. With the war in Afghanistan supposedly having ended, we cannot help but wonder how long our military will be involved with that nation. The war in Iraq ended and what do we have to show for that? ISIS has come into being and now controls a large portion of Iraq and Syria. The recent terrorist murders in Paris remind us of our vulnerability to others' actions. In the US in recent months, we have seen the clash between citizens and the police in several cities.

As I reflect on these horrible events and how quickly life's situation changes, I have thought about the two Greek words for time: *chronos* and *kairos*. *Chronos* refers to measured time—the tick-tock of the clock, the markings of days and weeks on the calendar. *Kairos* refers to time God marks off and fills with meaning.

Our culture is obsessed with *chronos* time: the years of a person's life; the months of the school year; the hours of the work day; the length of a TV program, the minutes of a football game and, for some, the length of the worship service. Because our lives are oriented around the 24/7 hours/days, we are constantly aware of *chronos* time.

Merchandise advertisers are most adept in the use of *chronos* time. There is the urgency in the voice promoting the merchandise, the ads for the "best bargains of the year," this Thursday through Saturday only "buy one and get two free."

Kairos time is very different from *chronos* time. In addition to creation, a dramatic example of *kairos* is the birth of Jesus: *and the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory,*

the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth (John 1:14). In the *kairos* of Jesus, God acted freely by giving a sure word which honors and intensifies life. It makes a difference to us to know of this *kairos*.

With the senseless atrocities we have witnessed in our country and many foreign lands, I am certain many of us have sought, and continue to seek, the heart of God—the place where *chronos* and *kairos*, time and timelessness, meet. Unable to comprehend the reason for murderous acts, we ask God to help us to bear the *chronos* event as an aberration of evil within God's *kairos*. These atrocities show us we cannot control what happens in *chronos*, but we can become more aware and open to God's *kairos*.

Jean Blomquist, a writer of contemporary religious issues and spirituality, writes about her attempt to balance the personal, professional and spiritual aspects of her life in an article, *Holy Time, Holy Timing* (in *Weavings*, Vol. VI, No. 1): "I've discovered at least two things, neither of which I yet fully comprehend. First, there is a holy timing that deals with the larger order and rhythm of our life events. Second, each moment, regardless of what we are doing, can be a *kairos* moment. The long stretch of holy timing and the immediate *chronos* moment link our lives with God. The challenge that continually confronts us as people of faith is to incorporate God's holy timing into our lives. We seek to discover the meeting place of *chronos* and *kairos* and to open our hearts to the holy within each *chronos* minute." Blomquist advises that we must strive for a continuous, centered interaction with the Holy Spirit who will reveal to us (perhaps not in our impatient *chronos* time, however) the holy timing of God.

We live, in varying degrees, with fear and anxiety from the hideous acts of murder in our own homeland and others' homelands. We as a nation and we as Christians are aware of our vulnerability, in terms of physical life. Media reporters constantly remind us about the potential harmful acts that might be inflicted upon us. There is only one source of surety for us—that is God's gift to us in Jesus Christ.

As I think about the atrocities in both the US and elsewhere, I have found Paul's letter to the Church in Rome provides me with some feeling of well-being and peace, and I pray this Scripture may provide you with some feeling of well-being and peace. Romans 8:38-39 present a compelling statement as the basis for Christian confidence during these uncertain times. *For I am convinced that there is nothing in death or life, in the realm of spirits or superhuman powers, in the world as it is or the world as it shall be, in the forces of the universe, in heights or depths—nothing in all creation that can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.* (The NEW ENGLISH BIBLE translation) We can be assured there is nothing that we can imagine, including people with assault weapons that have no place in civilian society, that have the power to frustrate God's care and love for us, in this life and the next.

As you seek peace of heart for yourself and others, ask the Holy Spirit to keep you in close contact with God. Set aside some *chronos* time--10 to 20 minutes--each day to "center" yourself on God. "Seek first God's rule and God's okaying of you," Jesus said, "and then the other things will fall into place" (paraphrase of Matt 6:33). When we become aware of God's presence in our lives, *kairos* moments may occur when least expected.

Regardless of the external circumstances over which we have no control, the rhythmic pulse of living is felt in that well-known passage from Ecclesiastes 3:1-2: *For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven: a time to be born, and a time to die; a time to plant, and a time to reap.*

As we live with uncertainty, may your *chronos* time realize the blessings of God's *kairos* time.

January 13 was a long meeting for the Council from 7:00 P.M. until after 10:00 P.m. Why such a long meeting? Well, there was a lot of important business to be taken care of.

First, extending the contract of our Interim Pastor, which was to terminate on February 28, 2015, and leave us without a spiritual leader. Yes, Pastor Anderson's contract was extended until we have a permanent pastor or either gives 30 days' notice.

Also there was the 2015 Budget that was extended from the last Assembly Meeting. Mike Davis, knowing that it would be a long discussion, asked that it be done as the last item of the meeting. Mike, in his usual thorough way, used information from the last several years to create as accurate a budget as possible. There was a good turnout for the meeting. We celebrated Janet Wilkins' birthday with cupcakes even though she was not there because of the slippery weather. She makes so much food for all in the congregation that we wanted to celebrate her on her birthday.

Written reports were presented by Pastor Anderson and the various board chairs. Chuck Dickey gave a verbal report on the Call Committee and where they are in the call process. Information from those reports is included in this newsletter.

Please keep Council and your Call Committee in your prayers. They are working hard to do the best for Our Church and what the Lord would have us do with Covenant. Don't forget our Interim Pastor who is carrying on the spiritual work of Covenant and says he is glad to continue, but not for a long, long, long.... time. May God Bless us All!

Mid-Week Lenten Soup Supper & Worship

This year we will join again with the people of Lutheran Church of the Master during the Wednesday evenings of Lent for soup supper and worship with the Holden Evening Prayer, beginning February 25 and continuing through March 25. The theme for this year's worship will be The Tree of Life in Lent. The Lenten devotions will focus on the biblical use of the tree of life, based on the Scripture in Genesis 2:8-9, 15-18; 3:22-24. For Christians, that tree is the cross. Each week a biblical passage and a hymn cast some light on the cross of Christ as our tree of life.

Week 1, February 25: The tree of life in Eden is given, and then denied.

Week 2, March 4: God transforms the low tree into the tree of life.

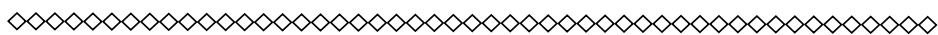
Week 3, March 11: We hold fast to wisdom, as if it were the very tree of life.

Week 4, March 18: The mustard bush is a tree of life only in a hidden way.

Week 5, March 25: Love, joy, peace, patience...are fruits of the tree of life.

The mid-week Lenten observance begins at 6:00 p.m with the soup supper, followed by the Holden Evening Prayer at 6:45 p.m. The service will end at approximately 7:30 p.m. Due to a pastor's schedule, Lutheran Church of the Covenant will host the first three Wednesdays supper and worship instead of alternating location each week, as in past years. The fourth and fifth Wednesday supper and worship will be at Lutheran Church of the Master, 860 Northfield Road, Bedford.

The five Lenten mid-week soup supper and worship provide each of us with the opportunity for community fellowship with the people of our sister ELCA congregation and share with them the beauty and quiet time of the Holden Evening Prayer. These events will help us to prepare our minds and our hearts for the sacrifice of Christ's life for our salvation that we observe during Holy Week. Members and visitors are welcome for supper and worship each of the five weeks.



Lent is a time of prayer, service, and self-examination. During this time, many of us choose to live simpler lives, remembering those who do not have the food, money, or resources to simply live. During the Lenten Soup Suppers, we will remember those who are hungry and living in poverty this season.

Adult Education and Bible Study Sessions

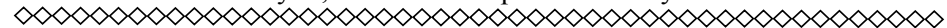
Sunday morning, following our worship service, there are two options for adults, members and visitors, to participate in an adult Sunday School class. One group, known as "Harry's Class," meets in the Lounge and is led by Rev. Harry Werner. We have lively and fun interactions with each other as we discuss each Sunday's lessons in light of our day to day experiences. We would certainly welcome any and all who would like to join us. Oh, and we do provide the Lutheran third sacrament-coffee-and, occasionally, Marie Zahn's fabulous baked goods.

The other group, functioning for many years as the Berean Bible Class is currently led by Pastor Anderson. This group meets in the kitchen overflow area adjacent to Parish Hall. Coffee and refreshments are provided by participants.

The Berean Bible Class on Sunday, February 8, will begin reading and discussing the book, Remembering Your Story, by Richard L. Morgan, a retired Presbyterian pastor with extensive experience in older adult ministry. We will be reading and discussing a way to create our own spiritual autobiography during a ten-week period (or longer) that includes a wide range of topics, including Life Stories, Childhood Stories, Family Relationships, Stories that Connect the Generations, and Healing of Memories.

Morgan provides well-developed illustrative material that aids in producing productive thoughts about how we became who we are and where we are going. There is the Four Ages Questionnaire that provides questions to arouse memory of one's life: Childhood and Teen Years, birth to age 25; Second Age (26-50); Third Age (51-75), and the Fourth Age (75+). While the class participants will be encouraged to enter the world of spiritual autobiography, there will be opportunities to share spiritual stories, if one is so inclined.

If you wish to participate in Remembering Your Story, please speak to Pastor Anderson or Alex Hohenstein to reserve a copy of the book that costs \$10.00. If the cost is difficult for you, we will make provision for you to have the book.



After a winter break, **the Bible Brunch** will meet on Thursday, March 19 at 9:30 a.m. in the kitchen overflow area. We gather around a meal and then are fed by the word of God. The Pastor's Bible study will be comparing the four Gospel texts regarding Jesus' final week in Jerusalem.

Patrick Parker Returns to Covenant for an Organ Recital Featuring J.S. Bach

On March 7, 2015 at 7 P.M. Patrick Parker, who served as our Organist from April 2010-June 2011, is returning to Ohio to play a solo organ recital before departing for Leipzig, Germany where he will be an exchange student at the University of Leipzig and guest student at the Mendelsson Conservatory.

The candle-lit concert will feature fabulous German music outlining Bach's influences, his music, and the legacy he influenced, in Covenant's sanctuary, which he describes as "a wonderful acoustic" and "an organ perfect for the repertoire".

The program will be in preparation for the Ninth International Taraverdiev Competition, and will be his last concert before heading to Germany.

In addition to the concert, there will be an Art of the Covenant Gallery opening featuring our own Marge Buettner's rug hooking pieces. There will be a reception after the concert.

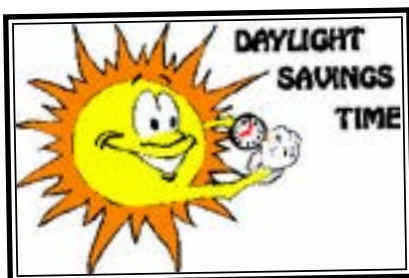

Journey Forward: Northeastern Ohio Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America God's Work. Our Hands

The Journey Forward is a process that groups of individuals in the cluster churches are engaging in in an effort to discover where God is calling us to tend the Gospel and love God by serving our neighbor.

The cluster (community of churches) through training and support is working to find out God's will for our group of churches. Our individual congregations will be gathering information, developing spiritual practices and building relationships in an effort to find out God's will for our congregation's future.

The participants of The Journey Forward at Covenant have been gathering information about members of Covenant. We have been conducting individual interviews in order to really get to know who we are and what it means to be a member of Covenant. We must learn to know each other and discover where we want to be as a congregation as well as where we want our congregation to be in relation to our community. It is not enough to come to church once a week, share the peace and go about our lives for the rest of the week without making a difference in each other's lives and the lives of the members of our community. We must continue to strive to build relationships so that we can become closer to each other. Then, together we can work to bring others closer to God through our collective efforts.

We are now venturing on to the next phase of the process. We are beginning to gather information about members of the community. We will be meeting with individuals who live in Maple Heights and discussing their concerns and getting to know them.
